Farmers, ranchers, and others working in agriculture often work with large animals and potentially dangerous machinery. In this line of work, people are subject to injuries from animals, transportation incidents, and contact with dangerous equipment." Not only is the safety of our employees a top priority at Midland Marketing, we also want our patrons to be diligent and aware of their day to day risks. Here are a few tips to help you stay safe on your farm and ranch:

 Install Rollover Protection Structures (ROPS) on tractors.
Replace all missing power take-off and rotating equipment shields. Shut off power equipment before leaving the operator's station.
Check that lights, flashers and reflectors on machines work properly. Always use them when traveling on roadways.

4. Replace "slow moving vehicle" emblems that are not clean and bright.

5. Inspect and repair farm machinery before the busy season. A well-maintained machine will operate more efficiently and reduce the chance of an injury.

6. Use proper equipment and procedures when hitching and unhitching implements.

7. Avoid wearing loose clothing to prevent entanglements and never

enter a manure pit, grain bin or silo without following confined space entry procedures. The gases and materials in these structures kill farmers every year.

8. Ensure that all workers receive specific instructions on their tasks and the machines they are operating. Be sure they read and understand all operational procedures in the owner's manual.

 9. Take time to learn basic first aid, CPR and emergency response.
10. Do not assign jobs to children unless they are physically, mentally, and legally ready to perform the job safely, follow directions and can respond to unexpected situations.
This may mean waiting until kids are at least 16 years of age.
11. Be familiar with hazardous chemicals. Take extra precaution when handling chemicals such as anhydrous ammonia, carbon dioxide, methane gas and hydrogen sulfide.

ABOUT FERTILIZER

What we have seen the last 6 months is shipping issues and higher priced fertilizer. It is still holding true in today's markets. We do not know the exact thoughts of the market but here is a brief overview of what insight we do have for the fertilizer going into spring.

We did see a slight dip in the prices at the beginning of the year for urea due to inventories that were on hand throughout the country but when Russia invaded Ukraine that had a cause for the short-term dip in prices to go back up. With the recent world issues, this is a cause for some issues in inventory as fewer vessels are heading towards the US. Many of the lines of communication are noting that we will not have a flood of products, so inventory looks to still be tight through the spring.

The Phosphate market looks just as volatile going forward as it has been the last 6 months. Many producers across the country are looking at the prices and trying to navigate where they need to go with their operations. We will see issues in shipping and product availability throughout the season, patience will be the name of the game. Know that Midland Marketing has been working to make sure that product is on hand or available and ready for the spring planting season.

CONDUCT SPRING TANK MAINTENANCE


Proper tank maintenance helps to keep your fuel supply clean and free from contaminants that can do harm to engines. Eliminating water, sediment and other impurities from the storage tank prevents these pollutants from entering your fuel system where they can plug filters, cause corrosion, and produce injector deposits that severely hampers performance.

Tank Maintenance Checklist:

- Drain and remove water and contaminants (every three months)
- Change bulk storage tank filters (at least twice a year)
- Clean pump screens (regularly)
- Clean tanks (annually)
- Ensure tank is tilted to direct water and debris away from outlet


- Replace vehicle tank filters (as recommended by manufacturer)
- Drain condensation (periodically) if vehicle tank filter has drain valve
- Check caps, sumps and vents for integrity and proper functioning
- Refer to OEM Manual for complete maintenance procedures

SMOKE ALARMS

Three out of every five home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms, according to the National Fire Protection Association. Test your smoke alarms every month and replace the battery at least once a year. If the alarm makes a "chirping" sound, replace the battery immediately.

Smoke alarms should be in every bedroom and in the common areas on each floor of a home. Mount them at least 10 feet from the stove to reduce false alarms, less than 12 inches from the ceiling and away from windows, doors and ducts.

Smoke alarms can be interconnected wirelessly. That means, when one sounds, they all sound. A Consumer Product Safety Commission survey found this is the best way to notify everyone in a home if there is a fire. Be sure to purchase smoke alarms with the label of a reputable testing agency, like Underwriters Laboratories (UL).




GRAIN MARKET

The markets remain quite volatile, and it may be a while before things settle down. Can we blame Russia for lighting the fuse that started all the havoc around the world; Absolutely. The commodity chart below shows a steady upward trend from the start of the Russian build-up, then shot almost vertically higher when Russia invaded Ukraine (See Chart). Also, let's not forget China and its saber-rattling to take over Taiwan. We should also toss in the drought across the America's, supply chain disruption from Covid, and the biggie INFLATION. When you throw all of that into a pot you get a hot mess of uncertainty.

The grain markets have become less liquid especially in the wheat complex. Without adequate liquidity the markets loose definition, which is important to traders in their ability to forecast where prices and basis may be headed. Basically, less liquidity in the markets increases price and basis volatility. The markets, of late, are considered 'thin' or 'illiquid', thus making it more difficult to execute trades, from the massive market price swings and increased basis volatility.

Unfortunately, with all the upheaval around the world this hot mess will take time to work through and, nobody really knows how long it will take. Some traders are projecting a more stable grain markets come May or June, others perhaps by calendar year-end. On flip side, producers need to take advantage of the increased volatility to lock-in bushels. If cash grain prices are at or above your target price, lock-in the (added) bushels. If not, take advantage and use Offer Contracts to take the worry out of watching the market, let us do that for you. Also, keep in mind Insured Discovery Price levels are pretty decent price levels, Wheat \$7.08; Milo \$5.88; Corn \$5.90; Soybeans \$14.33 per bushel.
